However, the process of finalizing these materials necessitates a thorough review and potential revisions to guarantee their accuracy and completeness. As stated in School Board Policy 2.22, supporting documents for regular school board meeting agenda items for which the board will take formal action will be posted in advance. This ensures that stakeholders have sufficient time to review materials related to decisions that directly impact the district. However, for workshop topics, there may be instances where supporting materials are not posted until the day of the session. This timing reflects our commitment to accuracy and providing the most current and comprehensive information.

Budget Highlights

FEFP and General Appropriations Act Highlights:

Total Funding: \$28.4 billion (Increase of \$1.8 billion or 6.73% over last year)

- Increase in Total Funds per Student served by a district is \$240.01, a 2.75 percent increase
- Base Student Allocation (BSA) increase of \$191.25 or 3.72 percent;
- FEFP Base Funds (flexible \$) increase of \$1.27 billion or 7.22 percent
- Required Local Effort increase of \$483.4 million; RLE millage maintained at prior year level of 3.189 mills
- Safe Schools Allocation: \$40 million increase for a total of \$290 million
- Mental Health Assistance Allocation: \$20 million increase for a total of \$180 million
- Coach Aaron Feis, Chris Hixon, & Coach Scott Beigel Guardian Program \$6.5 million
- School Recognition Program \$200 million
- Mentoring Programs \$12.2 million
- School District Foundation Matching Grants \$7 million
- Florida Safe Schools Canine Program \$3.5 million
- District Threat Management Coordinators \$5 million
- Education Stabilization Fund (Sections 73 and 74 of the GAA) appropriates \$50M and allows the unexpended balance of last year's appropriation to carry forward approximately \$250M total

Sarasota County School District:

- Increase in funding of \$26.1M (5.69%) compared to FY 23-24
- The Farm Project did not receive funding



Budget Highlights

HB 151 Retirement by Rep. Busatta-Cabrera:

- Estimated \$5-\$10M statewide impact to school districts
- Establishes the contribution rates paid by employers that participate in the Florida Retirement System (FRS) beginning July 1, 2024.
- Authorizes an FRS retiree to be reemployed with an employer participating in the FRS and receive both compensation and retirement benefits, after meeting the definition of termination. This eliminates the "suspension of benefits" period typically applied during months 7 through 12 after the date of termination.
- Closes the FRS Preservation of Benefits Plan to new members effective July 1, 2026.
- Final version did not include Cost of Living Increase (COLA) or 3% employee contribution.



HB 1285 – Education by Rep. Canady:

- Authorizes school districts to assign disruptive students to a disciplinary program or alternative-to-expulsion program and authorizes alternate methods of communicating to parents regarding placement into a dropout prevention and academic intervention program.
- Prohibits school districts from identifying students as eligible to receive services through the dropout prevention and academic intervention program based solely on a student having a disability.
- Requires an academic intervention plan for each student enrolled in a dropout prevention and academic intervention program.
- Revises the deadlines for submission of turnaround plans and requirements under a turnaround option
 available to low performing schools and specifies the responsibilities of a school district and charter school in
 implementing a turnaround plan for a public-school reopening as a charter school.
- Provides that, beginning in the 2024-2025 school year, any changes made by the State Board of Education
 (SBE) to components in the school grades model or to the school grading scale go into effect, at the earliest, in
 the following school year.
- Districts must provide students in grades 11 and 12 an opportunity to take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) and consult with a military recruiter during the school day.
- Limits residents of a county who are not the parent or guardian of a student to only one book/material objection per month.

HB 1473 School Safety by Rep. Trabulsy:

- Allows certain individuals to be certified as school guardians without completing specific training requirements, adjusting training mandates.
- Requires schools and sheriffs to timely report information regarding school guardians and their programs to the Department of Law Enforcement, which will maintain a comprehensive list and report non-compliant entities.
- Establishes penalties for unauthorized drone operation over public and private schools.
- Requires district school boards to provide instruction on the use of a mobile suspicious activity reporting tool to students once each school year.
- Obligates superintendents provide notification of certain alleged acts by dual-enrolled students
- Directs the Office of Safe Schools to develop and adhere to a school safety compliance inspection report, conduct unannounced inspections, and refer non-compliant personnel for disciplinary action.
- Requires schools to keep records of emergency drills, including active assailant emergency drills, and comply with specified safety requirements such as locking classrooms and identifying safe areas.
- Requires district school boards and charter school governing boards to adopt a progressive discipline policy for personnel who knowingly violate school safety protocols.
- Requires all gates or other access points must remain closed and locked when students are on campus unless
 attended or actively staffed by a person when students are on campus. Provides an exemption if the school safety
 specialist documents the rationale to the department in the FSSAT. Shared use agreements are exempt from these
 requirements.
- Provides a \$1,000 bonus to each eligible school principal and charter school administrator for compliance with all school safety requirements.



SB 7002 Deregulation of Public Schools by Sen. Hutson:

- Allows the school district to post public notices on the school board's official website as an alternative to the county website or the newspaper.
- Removes the requirement that school district must staff school district facilities during a declared state of emergency. The school district must continue to provide access to facilities.
- Allows proceeds from school bus stop arm camera program to be used to recruit or retain school bus drivers.
- Provides an alternative process for providing notice to parents other than certified mail regarding attendance, dropout prevention, and discipline.
- Removes the requirement that a district provide an Economic Security Report.
- Requires newly hired prekindergarten instructors to complete three emergent literacy courses within 45 days of hiring date.
- Specifies that the Department may subject school districts to varying frequencies of financial reporting based on a district's financial health and limits the frequency of financial reporting for a school district not in bad financial standing to no more than once a quarter.
- Continues to prohibit district purchases of transportation materials over a specified price but provides a
 process to request flexibility from the DOE.

SB 7002 Deregulation of Public Schools by Sen. Hutson (continued):

- Require the SBE to develop strategies to improve critical teacher shortage areas.
- Authorizes consideration of advanced degrees in determining salary adjustments.
- Provide that collective bargaining may not prevent a school board from its legal duties.
- Allows teaching certificates to be placed in inactive status and the DOE shall require professional learning to reactivate a license that is inactive for more than one year.
- Defines "inexperienced teacher" as one who has been teaching for less than three years.
- Provides certification and exam fee waivers for certain exceptional student education teachers.
- Repeals s. 1013.21, F.S. Reduction of relocatable facilities in use.
- Authorizes the lease-purchase of ancillary plants, and ancillary/auxiliary facilities.
- Repeals the requirement that a school district complete an educational plant survey and localized need assessment and submit to the Department under s. 1013.35, F.S.
- Removes the requirement that school districts submit plans to the DOE for use of existing relocatable as part of the five-year work program.
- Specifies that a district school board may not be required to build more emergency shelter space than identified as needed in the statewide emergency shelter plan.
- Suspends the cost per student station limits until 2028 (currently suspended through 2026).
- Increases the cap on day labor contracts per project from \$280,000 per project to \$600,000.

SB 7004 Deregulation of Public Schools by Education PreK-12 Committee:

- Removes the requirement that each school district provide at least one option for part-time and fulltime virtual instruction but requires that an option is availability either through FLVS or a contract with a private provider if a school district declines to provide.
- Allows a school district to meet the requirement to offer a summer VPK program by contracting with a private provider.
- Allows all 16-year-olds to take the high school equivalency examination upon filing a formal declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment.
- Removes the requirement for a school district that implements a middle school career and professional
 academy or career-themed course to collect and report student achievement data.
- Removes the current requirement that a school district participate in the Art in the Capitol competition.
- Removes the requirement that academically high-performing districts file an annual report with the State Board of Education.

SB 7004 Deregulation of Public Schools by Education PreK-12 Committee (continued):

- Modifies definition of "adequate instructional materials".
- Requires the Department to annually publish a detailed instructional materials timeline.
- Requires student progression plans include retention requirements for students in kindergarten through grade 2 based on deficiencies in reading and math and requires the plan to provide opportunity for parental input.
- Expands screening requirements to VPK students showing substantial deficiency in early literacy and math skills based on the results of the coordinated screening and progress monitoring and interventions that must be provided.
- Reduces the number of times that coordinated screening and progress monitoring must be administered during summer VPK, from three to two.
- Allows the SBE to extend the amount of time a school district has to implement a community school model.
- Increases the cap on expenditures for insurance and vehicles from capital outlay millage revenue from \$175 to \$200 per full-time equivalent student.

SB 1264 The History of Communism by Sen. Collins:

- Requires instruction on the history of communism starting in the 26-27 school year.
- DOE will be responsible for developing a standards for instruction and the bill requires the instruction to be age appropriate.

SB 994 Student Transportation Safety by Sen. Burgess:

 Authorizes school districts to contract with private companies using a revenue share model to implement a school bus stop arm camera program.

HB 931 School Chaplains by Rep. McClain:

- Allows school districts or charter schools to create policies for volunteer school chaplains to offer support, services, and programs to students.
- Mandates that school policies detail the types of support provided by chaplains and require parental notification and consent for student participation.
- Stipulates that volunteer school chaplains must comply with background screening requirements.
- Obligates any school district or charter school with a volunteer chaplain policy to publish a list of chaplains, including their religious affiliations, on their website.
- Requires chaplains to be selected by parents from a list that discloses any religious affiliations.



HB 1403 School Choice by Rep. Tomkow:

 The bill establishes new requirements and deadlines for Scholarship Funding Organizations (SFO) and parents whose children receive scholarship funding.

HB 1361 Education by Rep. Temple:

- Expands the eligibility for the New Worlds Scholarship to include students enrolled in a Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) Program, who exhibit substantial deficiencies in early literacy or math skills
- Establishes a tutoring program to be administered by an eligible nonprofit scholarship-funding organization. The tutoring program must be provided to students in kindergarten through grade 5 who have a substantial deficiency in reading or mathematics. The bill establishes a grant program that provides stipends for in-person tutoring during the school day, before or after school, or during a summer program.
- Establishes a grant program to expand the use of artificial intelligence in order to improve student outcomes and reduce teacher workload.

SB 883 Short-acting Bronchodilator Use in Public and Private Schools by Rep. Koster (Approved by Governor):

 Amends Florida Statutes to authorize public and private school students with asthma to carry and use short-acting bronchodilators (asthma inhalers) and components, and allows schools to acquire, stock, and administer these medications under specific protocols.

HB 1317 Patriotic Organizations by Rep. Duggan:

- Defines the term "patriotic organization" and authorizes, but does not require:
 - A school district to allow a representative of a patriotic organization the opportunity to speak with and distribute informational materials in a classroom setting; or
 - A patriotic organization to have displays at schools within the district.
- Requires a school district that authorizes access by a patriotic organization to provide a specific day and time for the patriotic organization to speak to students as well as providing notice to parents of such presentation that permits any parent to withhold consent for his or her child to participate.
- Prohibits a school district from discriminating against patriotic organizations relating to the use of a school building or school property outside of the school day.

SB 7032 Education by Appropriations Committee and Education Postsecondary Committee:

- Creates the Graduation Alternative to Traditional Education (GATE) Program, GATE Scholarship Program,
 GATE Startup Grant Program, and GATE Program Performance Fund.
- All four programs are aimed at re-engaging students who have withdrawn from high school by providing opportunities to earn CTE credentials while also completing a standard high school diploma or equivalent credential.

SB 917 Career and Technical Education by Rep. Snyder:

• Requires school districts to promote CTE opportunities and allows district school boards to provide other career and industry networking opportunities as an alternative to career fairs.

HB 49 Employment and Curfew of Minors by Rep. Chaney:

- Loosens restrictions on employment of minors, specifically allowing 16- and 17-year-old to work more than 30 hours per week, but only with parental consent or consent of their district school superintendent.
- Exempts students in home and virtual education programs from the requirements of the bill.

SB 472 Suits Against the Government by Sen. Brodeur

• Would have increased the sovereign immunity limits to \$300,000/\$500,000 and allowed school districts to settle above the limits without a claims bill.

HB 109 Charter Schools by Rep. Andrade

 Would have allowed municipalities to petition the Charter School Review Commission for approval and take ownership of school district buildings to open a city-run charter school.

HB 1429 District and School Advisory Councils by Rep. Bell

 Would have renamed district and school advisory councils as district and community advisory boards, required at least 70 percent of the members of the board be persons not employed by the school district, and established term limits for executive board members.

SB 734 Government Accountability by Sen. Ingoglia

• Would have prohibited renewal or extension of appointed superintendent and district general counsel employment contracts within 8 months of a general election for school board members.

Safe Schools increase of \$40M, Mental Health Assistance Allocation increase of \$20M

Instructional Programming

No legislative guidance this Session, unsure if FL DOE will provide any

Teacher Recruitment/Retention

• Instructional staff salary flexibility, fee waivers, and certification information in deregulation bills

Deregulation

 Many of these items have been highlighted so far. Two of the three bill sponsors, along with Senate President Passidomo, though not as President, could be back next year and are committed to continuing this effort





While Florida Statute does not set a financial condition percentage for school districts, 1011.051, FS does provide that if a district falls below 3% the Superintendent must notify FDOE. If the district falls below 2% they must submit a plan to address the financial condition and FDOE will monitor.

WHY focus on high-quality Prekindergarten programming?

First Five years of life are among the most critical phases of child development

Kindergarten readiness supports academic/behavioral growth and future success beyond traditional school years

Directly tied to later student outcomes, including the five college, career, and life readiness pathways



Kindergarten Readiness Matters:

If children enter kindergarten behind:

1 year – 26% chance of dropping out of high school

2 years – 45% chance of dropping out of high school


3 years – 55% chance of dropping out of high school

For children who enter kindergarten behind, roughly 75% will never catch up to their classmates.

The First Five Years Impact Success in School and Life

Every year 40 percent of children walk into kindergarten one-to-three years behind.

These students struggle to catch up. Sadly, most of them never do.

NEARLY 90% OF STUDENTS WHO FAILED TO EARN A HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA WERE STRUGGLING READERS IN THIRD GRADE.

Students who are not reading proficiently in third grade are FOUR TIMES more likely to drop out or fail to graduate from high school.

African American and Hispanic students not reading proficiently in third grade are SIX TIMES more likely to drop out or fail to graduate from high school. Low-income minority students not reading proficiently in third grade are EIGHT TIMES more likely to drop out or fail to graduate from high school.

Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) is a constitutionally mandated program for all 4-year-olds who reside in the state. Parents may choose a VPK program from the following options:

A 540-hour school year program

- OR a 300-hour summer program
- OR a Specialized Instructional Services program for children with IEPs who need care outside a traditional VPK setting

VPK Specialized Instructional Services (SIS)

 Takes place outside a traditional classroom setting and is designed for 4-year-olds with special needs who have current individualized educational plans from local school districts.

THE SCHOOL BOARD OF SARASOTA COUNTY, FLORIDA RESOLUTION 2024-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF SARASOTA COUNTY, FLORIDA ACKNOWLEDGING AND CONFIRMING THE SCHOOL BOARD'S OBLIGATION AND COMMITMENT TO PROVIDING EDUCATION TO ALL K-12 STUDENTS REGISTERED IN SCHOOLS OPERATED BY THE SARASOTA COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT CONSISTENT WITH THE OBLIGATIONS IMPOSED BY STATE AND FEDERAL LAW.

WHEREAS, in 1982 the Supreme Court of the United States held in the case, PLYLER v. DOE that denial of education to children not legally admitted to the United States violates the Equal Protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights mandates that all K-12 public schools "be open to all students, including migratory children, regardless of their parents' immigration status" and that public schools "offer language assistance services to K-12 students who have limited English proficiency, including migratory children"; and

WHEREAS, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits public schools from discriminating based on race, color, religion, and national origin; and

WHEREAS, Article IX, Section 1 the Florida Constitution states that "the education of children is a fundamental value of the people of the State of Florida" and that it is...a paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of *all* children residing within its borders"; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statute 1000.05 states that "discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion, or marital status against a student...in the state system of public K-20 education is prohibited"; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statute 1003.56 and Florida Administrative Code Rule 6A-6.0902 create a procedural scheme that calls for students to be first registered in schools and then assessed thereafter to identify students that are "limited English proficient"; and

WHEREAS, the School Board, by adoption of this Resolution, affirms its support of these vital federal and state constitutional, statutory, administrative, and court-mandated concepts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of Sarasota County, Florida ("School Board") in a public meeting duly called and assembled that:

1. The School Board, by adoption of this Resolution, hereby acknowledges and embraces its obligation to educate all K-12 students registered in Sarasota County School District operated public schools without regard to such student's immigration status, national origin, race, color, religion, disability, sex, or marital status.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution be spread upon the minutes of the School Board of Sarasota County, Florida.
